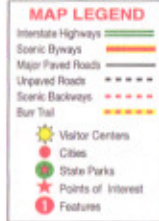

National Scenic Byway 12 -AN ALL-AMERICAN ROAD-

Scenic Byway 12 has been designated a National Scenic Byway and an All-American Road by the Federal Highway Administration. All-American Roads have one-of-a-kind features so exceptional that they qualify as a destination "unto themselves". Only a few National Scenic Byways achieve the status of All-American Roads, making Byway 12 one of the most unique roads in the United States.

Take time to explore National Scenic Byway 12, discover the scenery, culture, archeology and recreational opportunities that have made it an All-American Road.

Grand Staircase-Escalante Nat'l Monument

The Grand Staircase-Escalante National Monument extends over 1.7 million acres of sandstone canyons, plateaus, cliffs and unique rock formations in southern Utah's Garfield and Kane Counties. It is named for the Escalante River and for the Grand Staircase - a series of colorful cliffs that extend north from the Colorado River at the Grand Canyon to Bryce Canyon.

Slot canyons offer some of the world's best hiking and backpacking, and you can fish, camp, ride ATVs and mountain bike on the monument. Guided hikes, pack trips, horseback riding, and ATV, llama and Jeep tours are available locally. No services are available inside the monument. Most of the roads are dirt and are impassable when wet. Have plenty of gasoline in your vehicle, and take food, water and emergency supplies. The area gets hot in the summer so plan hikes accordingly.

The monument is managed by the BLM. When planning to visit the monument, stop at the Interagency Office, Escalante for current info and maps.

Popular Fishing Spots

Lakes & Reservoirs: Panguitch Lake, Otter Creek Res., Tropic Res., Wide Hollow Res., Pine Lake, Posey Lake, Barker Res., Lake Powell, and many small mountain lakes. **Streams:** Hatch Area: Sevier River, Mammoth Creek. **Panguitch/Panguitch Lake Area:** Panguitch Creek, Barker Creek, Deer Creek, Butler Creek. 3. Mammoth Creek Fish Hatchery South from Hatch on US 89 for about 1 mile turn west and follow signs to the hatchery which is operated by the Utah Wildlife Resources. Visitors are welcome. There is stream fishing in nearby creeks and the Sevier River near Hatch.

4. Panguitch Located at the junction of US 89 and U-143. First settled in 1864, Panguitch is noted for its unique red brick homes and its early history. Stop at the local visitor center for a brochure "Let's take a walk" - a walking tour of the historic buildings including the county courthouse. Visit the Paunsaugunt Wildlife Museum with exhibits of more than 300 animals from North America and around the world in their natural habitat.

5. Butch Cassidy's Homestead Notorious turn-of-the-century outlaw, Butch Cassidy grew up in the area. His boyhood home can be seen along US 89, 25 miles north of Panguitch

6. Otter Creek Reservoir North from Panguitch on US 89, east on U-62 to Otter Creek Reservoir, then south on U-22 to Antimony. Expect to see wildlife. Otter Creek State Park has fishing, boating and swimming. Antimony is an old mining town.

7. Tropic Reservoir The road to the reservoir is located south off Byway 12, about 4 miles west of the U-12/63 turnout to Bryce Canyon. The large lake lies in the Dixie National Forest. The area has red rock formations, and is popular for hiking, mountain biking, fishing and boating.

8. Red Canyon Located on Byway 12 about 2 miles from the junction of U-12/ US 89. The scenic and forested red rock canyon is popular for photography, hiking and mountain biking. Horseback rides are available. ATVs are permitted on designated trails that connect with the Fremont ATV Trail

9. Bryce Canyon National Park The jewel of the area, Bryce Canyon National Park is located on U-63, about 17 miles east from US 89/U-12 junction. This dazzling amphitheater of pink and orange hoodoos, cliffs, and spinnacles is popular for sightseeing, hiking, photography and

13. Kodachrome Basin State Park / Grosvenor Arch* Kodachrome is local on paved roads 9 miles south of Cannonville. Hike, mountain bike or take a trail ride among the colorful, unique rock formations and cliffs. The Grand Staircase-Escalante National Monument starts near the entrance to Kodachrome Basin. A dirt road - Cottonwood Canyon Scenic Backway (impassable when wet) travels south into the monument. Nine miles south of Kodachrome is the towering Grosvenor Arch. The dirt road continues south following the Paria River.

14. Barker Reservoir / Posey Lake Check local road and weather conditions before traveling on these dirt and gravel roads. From Escalante, drive up North Creek Canyon to Barker Reservoir. Make a loop ride across Whites Flat Road (7 miles) and join the Posey Lake Road/Hell's Backbone. Fishing, hiking and mountain biking are popular in this 9000' mountain setting. Ask for details in Escalante.

15. Escalante Petrified Forest State Park / Wide Hollow Reservoir One mile west of Escalante on Byway 12. Hike through the petrified forest where specimens of petrified wood can be seen. Fishing is popular at Wide Hollow Reservoir.

16. Hell's Backbone Check local road and weather conditions before traveling on these dirt and gravel roads. Follow the Posey Lake/Hell's Backbone Road from Escalante. Hell's Backbone is a rugged, thrilling, high mountain road and bridge over looking Box Death Hollow.

17. Calf Creek Recreation Area. Calf Creek is located between Escalante and Boulder on Byway 12. Hike the 3 miles to the spectacular and refreshing lower trails. Allow a half day to hike, Part of the Grand Staircase-Escalante National Monument.

18. Devil's Rock Garden / Hole-in -The-Rock Drive 18 miles south of Escalante along the gravelled Hole-In-The-Rock Road. Devil's Garden is a "garden" of unique rock formations and arches. For a day hike in the slick rock and convoluted sandstone of the Escalante Canyons, consider Peekaboo and Spooky Canyons. Stop at the Interagency Office in Escalante and inquire about the hikes, road conditions, etc. The area is part of the new national monument.

19. Anasazi Indian Village State Park Located in Boulder, this
